

Count it out

A **pressurised metered dose inhaler (pMDI)** should always be used with a spacer. A spacer helps the medicine get into your lungs, ensures you are getting the right amount of medicine and lowers your risk of side effects.

Each pMDI inhaler usually contains between **120-200 puffs**. The inhaler contains a propellant to deliver the medication, and it will continue to spray even after the medication has run out.

Many people do not realise their inhaler is empty. If you do not keep track, it may still feel like it's spraying medicine but is only spraying propellant.

It is therefore important to:

- Check how many doses are in the inhaler when it is new
- Work out how many days the inhaler should last depending on how often you use it each day
- Mark on a calendar or set a reminder to alert you a week or two before it is due to run out

A **Personal Asthma Action Plan (PAAP)** helps to keep your asthma under control. A PAAP will:

- Ensure you take preventer medication as directed
- Make sure you attend a regular asthma review each year

You can use this table to mark off how many does have been used from your inhaler. **Please remember:**

- Collect a new inhaler before your inhaler runs out
- Return the empty inhaler to your local pharmacy for disposal
