Resources to support suicide prevention in education settings in Staffordshire and Stoke-on- Trent

(May 2026)

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Introduction

Following the creation and distribution of the document [Guidance for education settings responding to a sudden unexpected death being treated as a suspected suicide](#), it has been suggested that a summary of some of the other resources available to help prevent suicides in education settings might also be helpful.

This document is not intended to be a guide in itself but aims to signpost the reader to key guidance materials, training opportunities, and system-wide support that can help education settings reduce the risk of suicide within their communities. It is designed to increase knowledge and understanding around suicide prevention, as well as to support staff in knowing what to do when situations arise. As such, it has been created as both a proactive and reactive resource for schools. The document also includes a section outlining PSHE (Personal, Social, Health and Economic) resources that are appropriate for use in suicide prevention.

This document has been created by members of the Staffordshire and Stoke-on-Trent-wide CYP (Children and Young People) Suicide Prevention subgroup of the wider Integrated Care System (ICS) CYP Prevention Workstream group.

PAPYRUS

PAPYRUS Prevention of Young Suicide is a charity dedicated to the prevention of suicide and the promotion of positive mental health and emotional wellbeing in young people. PAPYRUS offer a range of training offers (detailed later in this document), a schools-based educational resource called *Sinking Feeling* to assist with the teaching of mental health, emotional wellbeing, and suicide awareness to students from Y6 – Y13, but we would particularly draw your attention to their [Building Suicide-Safer Schools and Colleges: A Guide for Teachers and Staff](#)

This is highly recommended as a key resource to support suicide prevention, intervention and postvention in schools and colleges, aimed specifically at teachers as well as school or college staff. It aims to equip teachers with the skills and knowledge necessary to support school children who may be having suicidal thoughts. The guide uses a ‘community-model’ – supporting the belief that suicide is everyone’s business and that the community must be equipped and supported to prevent young suicide – as well as urging children and young people to speak up or ask for help – this was a key recommendation of the recent Child Death Overview Panel (CDOP) Suspected Suicide Thematic Review.

Samaritans is known as an all-age charity, and whilst they don’t provide the specialist guidance document offered by PAPYRUS, they do have a range of support offers for schools, college communities and other youth settings through their postvention services, lesson plans and school talks.

Suicide Awareness Training

It is easy to be overwhelmed if searching for suicide awareness training online, but the following examples are for free or low-cost training with established credentials.

Zero Suicide Alliance

For a quick introduction to suicide awareness the Zero Suicide Alliance provide several **free** short online interactive sessions.

Of particular interest might be the 'standard' session which can be taken by anyone who wants to learn basic suicide awareness and prevention skills, and takes no more than 30 minutes, and the 'Autism' version which was co-produced with people from the autistic community, and which takes up to one hour.

North Staffordshire Mind Suicide Prevention Awareness Training

Staffordshire County Council and Stoke-on-Trent City Council commission North Staffordshire Mind to provide regular, free half day online training sessions (held via Zoom) for anyone living or working in Staffordshire and Stoke-on-Trent.

The training has been designed to:

- Help you recognise signs that someone may be at risk
- Train you to use a simple 4-step suicide intervention
- Share information with you about local support service

Two versions of the training are available – the 'standard' version which is applicable to everyone, and a specialised version - 'focus on children and young people' version which is recommended for adults who work with or otherwise regularly interact with young people.

PAPYRUS Prevention of Young Suicide

PAPYRUS Prevention of Young Suicide offer a range of free and costed suicide prevention training, which is available to individuals, organisations and communities who want to create a suicide-safer society.

SPARK (SPARK - Suicide Prevention Awareness, Resource, Knowledge) is a free 45-minute course via Zoom designed as an introduction to PAPYRUS and suicide prevention

The following courses have an associated charge although PAPYRUS keep the cost as low as possible:

- SPOT (SP-OT – Suicide Prevention Overview Tutorial) is a 1.5-hour introductory course via Zoom
- SPEAK (SP-EAK Suicide Prevention – Explore, Ask, Keep-Safe) is a 3.5-hour course via Zoom
- ASIST (Applied Suicide Intervention Skills Training) is a two-day face to face skills building workshop that prepares caregivers to provide suicide first aid interventions.

NHSE E-Learning Hub

Stay Well

As part of Children and Young People Mental Health Awareness training, Stay Well provides a free 2-hour Suicide Awareness Programme – where individuals can gain an understanding about suicide in children and young people, learn to identify and recognise signs of suicidal thoughts and actions, develop the skills and confidence to approach children and young people to discuss suicide, and gain the knowledge and skills to create a safety plan with children and young people.

System Support

Stay Well

Stay Well is an emotional health and wellbeing service for children and young people living in Staffordshire and Stoke-on-Trent.

Stay Well is provided by Changes Health & Wellbeing, working in partnership with North Staffordshire Mind and the Dove Service.

The service works with children and young people, aged 5-18 years (up to 25 years with SEND), to support their emotional health and wellbeing.

Operating within the THRIVE framework, Stay Well offers a wide range of interventions designed to ensure CYP's emotional health and wellbeing.

Stay Well is provided from local venues across Staffordshire and Stoke-on-Trent, including wellbeing centres, community venues, schools and colleges.

A summary of the services is provided below:

Getting Advice

Stay Well provides advice to young people who may need support to cope with changes or things that are happening in their life, i.e. guidance on self-support (including signposting to online resources on the Stay Well website).

Parents and professionals can also contact the Stay Well team for advice on how best to support a young person's mental health.

Designed to support schools to develop and embed a whole school approach to mental health, Stay Well also offers professionals and parents the opportunity to attend CYP mental health awareness training, providing them with a better understanding of young people's mental health issues and how they can offer advice. Training sessions include:

- Understanding the Emotional Wellbeing and Mental Health of Children & Young People (4 hours)
- Suicide Awareness (2 hours)
- Supporting children and young people with Worry & Low Mood (2 hours)
- Raising Self-Esteem in Children & Young People (2 hours)
- Dealing with Difficult Emotions – Anger (2 hours),
- Cyberbullying & Social Media Awareness (2 hours),
- Supporting children & Young People with Bereavement & Loss (2 hours)
- LGBTQ+ Awareness (2 hours)
- Understanding disordered eating in CYP (2 hours)
- Understanding Neurodiversity (2 hours)

Stay Well also offers access to accredited CYP Mental Health First Aid Training. As part of this whole school approach, Stay Well also provides targeted psycho-educational programmes, wellbeing assemblies and school mental health ambassador training.

Getting Help

Stay Well provides more structured help for young people who are struggling with their mental health and need help to get well, with a clearer understanding of what a young person is going to get out of engaging with our services. Services include:

Weekly Peer-Support Groups – age-appropriate meetings, where young people can connect, offer each other support, and learn how to manage mental distress.

Psycho-educational Programmes – a series of fun, interactive and age-appropriate training sessions designed to give young people the tools to improve their emotional wellbeing. Programmes include:

Wellbeing Programme – providing young people with information about and strategies to manage Anxiety, Low Mood, and Low Self-Esteem.

Decider Programme © developed by Cognitive Behavioural Therapists to provide young people with 12 skills that they can use to manage their emotions.

Dealing with Difficult Emotions Programme - providing young people with information about strategies to manage anger and aggression.

Getting More Help

Where a young person's mental distress has started to negatively impact their home, school or social life – Stay Well provides more structured and focused support for 5- to 18-year-olds.

This includes:

1-2-1 Therapy: a number of sessions with a trained therapist, helping the young person to explore and understand their mental health issues, introducing techniques to enable them to build on their strengths, develop more helpful thinking and behaviour, improve their coping skills and set and achieve wellbeing goals.

1-2-1 Counselling for Grief & Loss: designed to help young people to process intense emotional, physical and cognitive reactions associated with significant loss. Whilst often related with death, it also addresses other life-altering losses, such as parent's divorce, the ill-health of a family member, change in financial circumstances etc.

Mental Health Support Team in Schools

Mental Health Support Team in Education (MHST) is an NHS service made up of Education Mental Health Practitioners and Children's Wellbeing Practitioners that work within schools across Staffordshire. The service provides early intervention and prevention to support children and young peoples' mental and emotional wellbeing.

The Mental health support team can be accessed by contacting the Mental health lead within the school setting.

Staffordshire Educational Psychology Service (EPS)

Staffordshire EPS supports children and young people aged 0–25, alongside their families and schools. They use specialist training and experience in psychology to understand and support a wide range of needs, including situations that are complex or challenging.

The service can provide advice and support in relation to self-harm. They have developed a series of self-harm webinars for parents, available via [Staffordshire Connects](#).

They have also produced a [Self-Harm Guidance Document](#), which offers practical advice and guidance for schools and families.

They offer free critical incident support following the death of a young person at a Staffordshire school. The service will contact the school directly to provide advice, guidance, and emotional support during difficult times.

Training and professional development

Staffordshire EPS offers a range of training opportunities for schools, including:

- Self-esteem
- Bereavement and loss
- Emotion coaching
- Attachment and trauma
- Anxiety and worries
- Emotional wellbeing

ELSA (Emotional Literacy Support Assistant) programme

Staffordshire EPS delivers a highly regarded ELSA training course, which equips teaching assistants to support the emotional needs of pupils in school. Course topics include emotional wellbeing, anxiety, self-esteem, bereavement, and loss.

They also provide half-termly supervision for trained ELSAs and currently support over 17 ELSA supervision groups across Staffordshire.

Exam stress support

If schools require advice relating to exam stress, this can be discussed with their linked Educational Psychologist. The EPS team will then develop a bespoke support package tailored to the needs of the pupils they wish to support.

Stoke Educational Psychologist Services (EPS)

Stoke-on-Trent Educational Psychology Service (EPS) supports the wellbeing, resilience, and sense of belonging of children and young people across the city. Although the EPS does not provide mental health diagnoses or crisis intervention, educational psychologists play an important role in suicide prevention by working in positive, relationship-focused, and developmentally informed ways with schools, families, and other services.

The work centres on recognising strengths, building protective factors, and supporting the positive relationships that help children and young people feel safe, valued, and understood. By doing this, it aims to help reduce vulnerability and support emotional wellbeing.

Stoke on Trent EPS provides several core services to schools and settings at no direct cost. These include:

- Solution Circles – online collaborative problem-solving sessions for staff.
- Statutory Work – contributions to Education, Health and Care (EHC) needs assessments.
- Systemic and Strategic Projects – involvement in local and national initiatives, such as Relational Approaches in Education (RAiE) and Partnership for Inclusion of Neurodiversity in Schools (PINS).
- Critical Incident Response – provides setting leaders with psychologically informed guidance to support their response to events that affect the wellbeing and coping of the whole school community.

Schools and settings can also commission additional support from the EPS through a Service Level Agreement (SLA). This can include consultation; direct work with children and young people; and capacity building support such as training or workshops.

Education Safeguarding Advice Service (ESAS) – Staffordshire Learning Net (SLN) Resources

The Education Safeguarding Advice Service (ESAS) provides a dedicated area on the Staffordshire Learning Net (SLN) offering practical safeguarding resources that also include support suicide prevention and early identification of concerns. This includes many of the following resources.

All education settings will have two accounts to access the SLN, please speak to your DSL (Designated Safeguarding Lead) / Headteacher to obtain account details.

Resources available on SLN include:

- **Safeguarding guidance documents** – including suicide-prevention materials, local pathways, and advice on responding to concerns about self-harm or suicidal ideation.
- **Templates and tools** – such as safety planning tools, risk-assessment templates, conversation prompts, and a link to the postvention guidance.
- **Training materials and signposting** – ESAS-led content plus links to wider suicide-prevention learning opportunities.
- **Support for risk assessing and safety planning**- includes examples of these and education colleagues are supported with these if required

These resources support DSLs in delivering consistent, evidence-informed safeguarding practice and responding confidently to concerns linked to self-harm, mental health and suicide risk.

Addressing Suicide Through the PSHE Curriculum

The Department for Education (DfE)-published new statutory [Relationships Education, Relationships and Sex Education, and Health Education \(RSHE\) guidance](#) (effective from September 2026) does not require schools to teach explicitly about suicide. However, because the guidance references suicide prevention, schools may need support in deciding how to respond.

Schools can choose whether to address suicide directly, but if they do, they must proceed with caution. This should only happen after consulting mental health professionals with specialist expertise, and careful consideration should be given to:

- pupils' age, maturity, and personal experiences
- parents' and carers' views
- staff confidence and training

Schools must avoid any content that could be instructional or distressing, and they should never link lessons about suicide to a recent suicide in the school community.

There is strong evidence that broader mental health education—already a key part of PSHE—helps prevent crises. Teaching children and young people to:

- recognise and express emotions
- manage friendships, loneliness and challenges
- look after their wellbeing
- know how and where to seek help

This all contributes to suicide prevention without mentioning suicide directly.

The statutory guidance (pp. 25–26) supports this, noting that most aspects of suicide prevention are already included within wider mental wellbeing education.

If a school chooses not to teach directly about suicide, the topic may still arise during lessons. Staff should:

- avoid discussing specific methods of suicide
- focus on help-seeking and support
- follow up individually with the pupil through safeguarding or pastoral systems, rather than addressing the issue with the whole class
